### When Confusion Can Be Dangerous

New or worsening confusion is not a normal part of aging; it could be delirium. Delirium symptoms can be similar to dementia and are most often noticed in the hospital by family and friends.

#### **Delirium**

- Happens quickly within hours or days
- New changes in confusion or behaviors
- Can come and go
- Can usually be reversed

### **Causes of Delirium**

- Severe illness or injury
- Changes in the body's chemical processes
- Medications
- Surgery
- Infection
- Alcohol or other drug withdrawal

#### Dementia

- Develops over months to years
- Memory loss
- Impairments in language and judgement
- Gets worse over time

### Delirium Symptoms - Difficulty with:

- Staying focused
- Thinking clearly
- Understanding surroundings
- Remembering recent events

### **Consequences of Delirium**

- Increased worry or being upset
- Becoming withdrawn

### What can you do if you notice symptoms?

- Immediately share your concerns with a healthcare provider
- Keep a list of medications and surgeries
- Note when symptoms began and how they are different from the person's typical behavior
